Chamber musicians TonTrio



onTrio started in 2006 when three students met at a music university in Karlsruhe, southern Germany. A new violin player joined the crew this year and now the trio comprises of Julia Kraus on piano, Karlotta Schmied on violin and Daniel Haverkamp on cello.

"Working together as a chamber music ensemble, the possibility arises to play a music piece far more intensively than an orchestra will ever be able to. This is because we know each other well and if we are able to show the audience this intimacy, magical moments arise both for the audience and musicians," answers Daniel, when asked what it takes for a trio like them to be successful.

"This time, we will only play western music, ranging from the period of Vienna Classic with Beethoven, one of the first composers of the romantic era Robert Schumann, to Dmitri

Shostakovich," he says.

If you thought that classical musicians only like to listen to classical music, he says otherwise, "Of course it's always interesting and necessary to listen to all kinds of music to think out of the box. But our favourite still is western classical music with all its facets and different styles. You have to listen to classical music intensively, you can't listen to it while talking or working."

Well, given the fact that not much young people are into western classical music — how do you introduce it to them? "You can only reach a younger audience if you're convinced of what you are doing and if it's your desire to show it to young people. Also, it must be presented to youngsters in a way that fascinates them. Besides, teachers and artistes have to change and cannot remain in their ivory tower."
